An Outing

The October program featured Nathan Rutz telling us about the work of Rust Belt Riders, a business formed by a small group of environmentally concerned young people to capture food waste and turn it into compost for the garden. Nathan explained how they started out, using bicycles – hence the name – to collect food waste from local restaurants and institutions, and then composting it.

As business grew, they acquired old trucks to make collection easier and more efficient. A couple of weeks ago, Carol Poh, my wife Ginnie and I decided to make a field trip to see the operation and purchase its product. RBR is located in an old warehouse at the northwest corner of Hamilton and Marquette in the St. Clair/Superior neighborhood.

Arriving in the midst of an icy rainstorm (welcome to winter), we met Nathan again, as well as his partners Daniel and Michael. Nathan gave us a tour of the facility, including a nascent worm farm and mechanical screening system developed from spare parts. Outdoors, in a succession of large bins, the compost was steaming away notwithstanding the cold air.

We collected our five-gallon bags, just \$10 each (quoting Carol, "it's like gold for the garden"), and headed down Hamilton Avenue in search of lunch. Hamilton is lined with vestiges of Cleveland's industrial past which hold promise, as well, for its future. Former factory buildings, such as the Brown Hoisting Machinery Co., have been repurposed for office space.

Our search for nourishment was rewarded at Marie's, a Croatian restaurant on the southeast corner of East 42nd and St. Clair that serves the specialties of the mother country in a homey setting. The stuffed cabbage, cauliflower soup, and strudel were tasty, the coffee hot. It was a fun and educational outing. Check out Rust Belt Riders at rustbeltriders.com.

Gardening Tips



WINTER CARE FOR HOUSEPLANTS



Winter weather adversely affects growing conditions for houseplants. Proper care during the winter months can help insure the health of houseplants.

Most houseplants grow well with daytime temperatures of 65 to 75 degrees F and night temperatures of 60 to 65 degrees F. Temperatures below 50 degrees F or rapid temperature fluctuations may damage some plants. Keep houseplants away from cold drafts, radiators, and hot air vents. Also make sure houseplant foliage doesn't touch cold windows.

Many houseplants prefer a humidity level of 40 to 50 percent. Unfortunately, the relative humidity found in many homes during the winter months may be only 10 to 20 percent -- a level too low for many houseplants. Humidifiers are an excellent way to increase the relative humidity in a single room or throughout the entire home. Group plants together. The water evaporating from the potting soil, plus water lost through the plant foliage (transpiration), will increase the relative humidity in the immediate vicinity of the houseplants. Another method is to place the houseplants on trays (saucers) filled with

pebbles or gravel and water. The bottoms of the pots should be above the water level.

Misting houseplants is not an effective method to raise relative humidity. Misting would have to be done several times daily to appreciably raise the humidity level and is simply not practical. In general, houseplants require less frequent watering during the winter months than in spring and summer. Actively growing plants need more water than those at rest during the winter months. Plant species also affects watering frequency. Ferns prefer an evenly moist soil and should be watered relatively frequently. Cacti and succulents, on the other hand, should not be watered until the potting soil is completely dry. The majority of houseplants fall between these two groups. Most houseplants should be watered when the soil is barely moist or almost dry to the touch.

When watering houseplants, water them thoroughly. Water should freely drain out of the bottoms of the pots. If the excess water drains into a saucer, discard the water and replace the saucer beneath the pot.

Houseplants need to be fertilized periodically when actively growing in the spring and summer. Fertilization is generally not necessary during the winter months because most plants are growing very little or resting. Indoor gardeners can begin to fertilize houseplants in March or April as growing conditions improve and the plants resume growth. Dust and grease often accumulate on the leaves of houseplants. The dust and grease not only makes them unattractive, it may slow plant growth. Cleaning houseplants improves their appearance, stimulates growth, and may help control insects and mites.

Large, firm-leafed plants may be cleaned with a soft sponge or cloth. Wash the foliage using a very mild solution of dishwashing soap and tepid water. Another method is to place the plants in the shower and give them a good "bath". Be sure to adjust the water temperature before placing the plants under the shower head.
