May 2019 Program Speaker

Laura Deeter, PhD, Professor - Horticulture Technologies, Ohio State ATI Program Coordinator: Landscape Horticulture and Horticulture Science



Laura Deeter received her PhD in horticulture from The Ohio State University after studying road-salt tolerance in herbaceous perennials under Dr. Steve Still. She is currently a Full Professor of Horticulture at Ohio State ATI in Wooster, OH teaching a multitude of horticulture classes including: Woody and Herbaceous Plant Identification, Landscape Design, Sustainable Landscaping, Plant Health Management, Landscape Construction, and Ecology, to name a few. She was awarded the ATI Distinguished Teaching Award twice, the OSU Alumni Award for Distinguished Teaching, the Perennial Plant Association Teaching Award the American Horticulture Society Teaching Award, and the Perennial Plant Association Service Award. She travels extensively around the country speaking on a variety of topics ranging from taxonomy and nomenclature to shade gardens, design, color, and specialty gardens and plants. At home she gardens on her tenth of an acre with her hubby, three dogs, 100 pink flamingos and counts her 300+ species of perennials as dear friends.

The Gardeners of America/Men's Garden Clubs of America celebrates 87 years as a national organization and the headquarters celebrates its Golden Anniversary, and 50 years at 5560 Merle Hay Road in Johnston, Iowa. It is also Johnston's 50th Anniversary of Incorporation.

The Holiday Inn Hotel and Suites, 4800 Merle Hay Road, Des Moines is ready with renovated rooms and refreshed spaces. The confirmed room rate is \$99/night and is available for three (3) days before and after the convention. The hotel is less than one mile from National's headquarters.

It's bloom season in the WILLOTT IRIS GARDEN!



Ron, Sandra and I have been back in the Willott Iris Garden for about 6 weeks beginning in late March to get a jump on the growing season. We are there because the Willott Iris Garden has been an ongoing project of the Gardeners of Greater Cleveland beginning with the rescue of hundreds of iris plants from the weeds at the Rockefeller Greenhouse in 2008. Today, due to the efforts of many people and organizations, including the Gardeners of Greater Cleveland, the Willott Iris Garden is a recognized Display Garden of the American Iris Society and the Historic Iris Preservation Society.

The Garden is also well on its way to being a part of the National Collection as an individual horticulturalist garden once that program gets fully established.

The Garden receives hundreds of visitors a year in bloom season and out. When we talk with the visitors we find that many are repeat visitors from previous years while many first timers are surprised that a garden dedicated to irises even exists in a public park. During bloom season the visitors are all in awe of the dazzling colors and varieties of irises in the garden.

The Willott Iris Garden requires at least 2,500 hours of work a year to maintain the garden at the standard expected for a public display garden and to talk to visitors about the garden and irises. Another couple hundred hours a year is required to do the paperwork to keep the holdings of the garden organized and identified and to comply with the continuing requirements of the national recognitions it has received.

All this work to keep the Willott Iris Garden requires dollars and people. The Gardeners of Greater Cleveland has been generous with both over the years. Because the Willott Iris Garden is an ongoing project of the club the membership is invited to lend a hand with the work, we are dirt gardeners after all.

Ron, Sandra and I are in the garden off and on from the beginning of November through the end of March. From the first of April through the end of October at least one of us is in the garden weather permitting (and sometimes without the weather's permission) from about 10 AM until about 2 PM Tuesday, Wednesday, Thursday and Saturday. May is the busiest time of the year in the garden. We have the most visitors to greet, the weeds are growing the fastest and the irises must be deadheaded and groomed more often.

We need your help. The weeding is obvious but the grooming and deadheading isn't "rocket science." Come to the garden, when one of us is there. Bring the garden tools you think helpful to weed and groom the irises and we will put you to work teaching you all you need to know about keeping the garden ready for the public and the irises healthy and growing as you work along side us.
