January Program Summary by Ginnie Dawson

John Barber, citizen scientist, licensed bird-bander, and Cleveland Heights resident presented a lively talk to members of GOGC on Monday, January 8. His theme was how to change our gardening habits to help restore and maintain the world's declining numbers of bird species. Birds are in trouble, he said. Gardeners like us, are influencers. We can make a difference by changing our gardening habits to benefit, not harm, wildlife. By setting an example, hopefully other gardeners will join us in adopting more ecofriendly ways to maintain their yards.

His well-paced talk, illustrated with artful slides, John explained how Cleveland is on the international Mississippi flyway used by migrating warblers. This flyway stretches from the Arctic Ocean to Patagonia. After crossing the Great Lakes in the spring, they are starving. Many die because what they are looking for are not the seeds in our bird feeders, but BUGS. The yellow warbler needs a bird buffet of seeds, berries, and insects. Bird feeders are not necessarily bad. They give us pleasure, but they do not help solve the problem of declining species. Feeders concentrate birds unnaturally in one place. They are also often unhealthy for birds because people do not clean them or clean up under them. This helps predators, like feral cats, get through the winter so that they can kill birds in the summer. Not only does the bird seed sold commercially lack the nutrition that birds need, but also some bird seed is harmful because it is commercially treated with chemicals. For example, house finches, so common in bird feeders in winter, get a chronic condition called "weepy eye."

If we want to help migrating birds, transform your garden into 75 percent native plants. Start small, replacing one plant at a time. Create a four-season habitat. Rip out ground covers like English Ivy and Pachysandra and replace them with ginger, a more attractive native plant that spreads well and attracts insects which eat its leaves. Plant native perennials like golden rod, milkweed, and asters; shrubs like dogwood, viburnum, witch hazel, and slow growing oaks. A parting thought—no need to clean up all our leaves in the fall. A perfect lawn is not necessarily a good goal. Leave a few bare spots to make it easier for the birds to find bugs and worms. A slightly messy, organically inspired yard, is GOOD FOR THE BIRDS.

He earned a Bachelor of Science in video game development and is currently working as a Software Engineer in Downtown Cleveland.


