# A Visit to Meadow City Native Plant Nursery

On Tuesday, January 13, 2026, Bob McMahon visited Meadow City Native Plant Nursery located in the North Collinwood neighborhood in Cleveland. Bob met with co-founders Dave Tomashefski (and fellow GoGC member!), Julie Slater, and Alyssa Zearley, to observe how their container perennials and woody plants are overwintered.

Perennials are cut back late in the late Fall while container trees are laid on their sides in preparation for covering for the winter. A foam covering is laid over the perennial containers and trees, followed by a single layer of white polyethylene plastic. The plastic is then tucked under the plants and secured on top either by wooden 2 x 4 planks or cables. This arrangement then traps the geothermal heat from the ground to keep the plants from freezing solid yet keeping the plants cold for winter dormancy requirements. Depending on Spring weather conditions, these coverings are usually removed in early March to break plant dormancy and start to produce new growth.

Trees are now being grown in plastic pots that root-prune the plants, preventing circling roots and eliminating the need for customers to trim any roots. A Quonset house containing nuts and seedlings of various tree species is covered with hardware cloth to exclude squirrels. Undergoing winter conditions allows for the stratification of the nuts or seeds, to break their dormancy to allow germination once temperatures warm in the Spring. The seedlings are covered with a sheet of foam to protect against the extreme winter cold.

A new plot of land has been prepared beneath a tree canopy for producing spring ephemeral wildflower seeds. Plants grown from wild-collected Northeast Ohio seed will be planted in these beds. In the future, seeds harvested here will be used to grow more slow-growing spring ephemerals for sale at the nursery. The soil has been covered with leaf mulch and awaits the perennial stock plants in the Spring.

Bob greatly enjoyed his visit with this quality nursery that is expanding as needed and already has an excellent reputation in the Cleveland area, thanks to these three dedicated professionals!

## January Program Recap

Last month we had a delightful talk by microbiologist, Mopelola Oluwadare. Originally from Nigeria, she studied at The University of Georgia. She has started a composting business in Stow, Ohio called The MikroLab.

Mope gave us some of the latest scientific thinking about why composting is important. Rich soil contains thousands of microorganisms. She pointed out that very little is known about them and how they encourage plant growth. She focused on several types of these microorganisms, including:

- Bacteria which transform nitrogen from soil into a form accessible to plants
- Fungi which transmit genetic information that allows them produce bigger roots to take up water more efficiently
- Protozoa, particularly nematodes, a microscopic round worm, which eats bacteria and decomposes and aerates the soil

She also discussed the successful restoration of a Zinc Pile Superfund Site in 2002. This involved the removal of the heavily polluted soil from an old smelting operation in Palmerston, PA. The area was seeded with native plants and restored to prairie landscape.

She concluded by commenting on how the microbes in our soil depend on each other. They act like a community. Composting is an act of soil stewardship on a cosmic scale that we can all participate in.

# February Program

Rid-All Green Partnership is an 18-acre urban farm and community organization in Cleveland's Kinsman neighborhood that transforms vacant, formerly dumped-on land into a green space for growing, composting, and education. Founded in 2011 by three friends, it serves as a "food desert solution by providing local produce, sustainable soil, tilapia farming, and job training for residents, youth, and veterans.

Executive director, George "Keymah" Durden, of Rid-All Green Partnership, will show a documentary video, highlighting the history of Rid-All and all of its programs. This will be followed by a Q&A session.


## Youth Gardening Grants Open February 1st!
